

RIS Magazine Designer LOVES to Clown Around — Literally!

We thought it would be fun for readers to learn more about *Recreational Ice Skating's* talented graphic designer, Brittany Allen. Brittany began designing *Recreational Ice Skating* (RIS) magazine in 2019 and works closely with editor Eileen Viglione to bring the pages of RIS to life. She feels fortunate for her role with ISI.

Below, Brittany answers some questions that will give you a behind-the-scenes peek at her career background and life as Zoe the Clown — yes (no clowning around), she's a professionally trained clown!

Q: What did you study in school to become a graphic designer? Did you always know that you'd be in this field of work?

A: "Following a year at the University of North Texas, where I aced my art classes and didn't quite ace my other studies, I transferred to Texas State Technical College, where I could take commercial art and advertising classes and really focus on what I loved — the process of creating. I received my Associate of Arts degree through their two-year program. And yes, I always knew art and being creative would be a huge part of my life. My aunt was in advertising, and I was always intrigued by her career and enjoyed seeing what she created!"

Q: Why do you enjoy working on RIS magazine? What is your favorite part about designing the magazine?

A: "Oh my gosh, where do I start? First off, I love working with ISI on the magazine. Eileen, Carol and I make the perfect team! Secondly, I absolutely love the creative process and freedom that I have to design neat layouts. I also get to use such an array of cool fonts, art and colors. It's different from most of the corporate work I do; it's much more fun! Lastly, I love getting to work with all the cute pictures of the skaters from different events and activities — they make me super happy!"

Q: What other types of projects do you work on?

A: "I design brochures, flyers, logos, business cards, posters, and so much more for my different clients. I also create clown logos for my clown friends – see next question!"

Q: What do you like to do in your free time?

A: "I have been Zoe the Clown since 2007, when I went to Mooseburger Clown Arts Camp for the first time. I've gone to Mooseburger every single summer since, to learn, laugh, stretch myself and recharge my clown batteries. In 2019, I was asked to join the staff and teach clowning 101 to new campers – it's been amazing!

"Clowning has changed my life in ways I couldn't have imagined and brought more joy than I could have dreamed into my life. When I put on that big red nose and my big, cute clown shoes, I am transported into a magical world of play, and when I make that wonderful connection with a child who needs a bit of 'happy' in their day, it's just the best!

"I've always known in my heart that I desired to work with children in need, and I'm proud of all that I've accomplished as Zoe these past 17 years. One very special thing I got to do was to visit India, where I visited orphanages to bring smiles and laughter to children on the other side of the world! My absolute favorite thing, however, was serving as a volunteer clown for 12 years at Medical City Children's Hospital in Dallas — until COVID hit — bringing joy and fun to sick children."

"Upon creation of this issue, I had just returned from another incredible and magical week at Mooseburger. I absolutely *love* being Zoe; the joy, the fun, the laughter, the friends, my loving and supportive 'clown family' — words just can't describe how lucky I feel to be a clown and have this as such a big part of my life. I'm totally in my happy place whenever I have that big, red nose on."

Q: Anything else you'd like to share?

A: "I just have some words of wisdom for readers: follow your heart, follow your passion and trust your instincts."

Congratulations to the 2024 ISIA Education Foundation Scholarship recipients:

Caroline Yeeley of Parkridge, III., who skates out of Niles Iceland Skate Complex in Niles, III., and Hannah Lee of Montgomery, Ala., who was a member of K-Lynn Skating School in Montgomery.

The skaters will each receive a \$7,500 award, payable directly to the educational institution of their choice over the next four years.

This year's scholarship amount represents a \$2,500 increase over last year's award of \$5,000.

"I am a second-generation ISI member, who has loved ice skating since first stepping on the ice at age 5," said Caroline. "Thanks to ISI, my childhood was filled with amazing skating experiences. I have met my idols, skated in Worlds Benefit

shows, and competed in solo, artistic, character, couples, synchro, and team events, all of which have fueled my joy for skating. I traveled to new cities with my best friends, where we competed our hearts out and, above all, supported one another.

"I have a huge smile on my face when I think about all the memories created at ISI competitions. Skating shaped who I am from the first lesson of learning how to fall and get up, progressing to take one step at a time, and challenging myself to learn new and demanding skills. I have become strong both mentally and physically by overcoming fear, anxiety and injury."




A FS 7 and Dance 4 level skater, Hawwas also a synchro team leader. She is pursuing her studies at Emory University in Atlanta.

"Figure skating is one of the most beautiful blends of athleticism and artistry in the world," said Hannah. "Gliding across perfectly smooth ice is a feeling that no words could ever do justice. With the cold wind rushing against my face, I truly

feel like I can fly when my skates are on. I feel like I can do anything. It's a treasure to be able to breathe it, to feel the music, to have creative liberties with no bounds, to challenge myself with new elements, and to build immediate connections with diverse skaters at recreational ISI competitions all over the country. There is no sport quite like skating.

"At 5 years old, I began my skating journey in a tiny rink inside the Eastdale Shopping Mall in Montgomery, Ala. This rink soon became home — the place I could go to when I felt lost and unmotivated — because skating always reignited my flame. Despite countless falls, bruises, and moments of frustration for not landing a jump I know I'm fully capable of landing, I credit my biggest moments of growth to skating. It has humbled me to my core, built the foundations of my resilience, and has often broken me down, yet built me back up so much stronger."

recognized for 'Figure Skating Physics' PROJECT

When ISI skater **Lena Perez, 10**, of Bowie, Md., had to come up with a project idea for participation in her school's STEM fair, it was a no-brainer. The fourth grader at Heather Hills Elementary School chose to combine her interest in science and math with her love of skating.

The result? Her project, "Figure Skating Physics," went on to earn a second place award (in physics and astronomy) in the Prince George's County Public School's STEM Fair, held May 18. She was selected as her school's fourth grade representative to participate in the county STEM fair, which included 154 participants from 34 elementary schools.

"I came up with my idea because different coaches told me different recommendations on how long I should hold my edge before I spun," said Lena. "I wanted to find which length was the best for the more rotations."

For her project, she tested a classical physics and mechanics question: Does the length of the push affect the number of rotations in a one-foot skating spin? She recruited five figure skaters to help her with her experiment.

"I will be using a circle with a diameter of 4 feet," she wrote in her project summary. "Each skater will use no push, ¼ of the circumference of a circle push, and ¾ of the circumference of a circle push before their spins. Then I will review the number of rotations in each spin to see if the lengths of the push affect the rotations.

"My results show that the push length affects the number of rotations in a one-foot figure skating spin. Using a $\frac{1}{2}$ of a circle push will give you more rotations in a one-foot figure skating spin than the other lengths I used for testing. I predicted using $\frac{1}{2}$ of a circle push would get the most rotations. This means my hypothesis was correct."

Lena, a fifth grader this fall, is hoping her research can help other figure skaters improve the number of rotations in their spins.

"I might do more figure skating physics projects in the future and test if my theory works with more advanced spins or with more momentum/speed by doing crossovers before the spin," she said.

How did Lena get her start skating? At age 7, she went to the ice rink for the first time with her Girl Scout troop. Now she skates once or twice a week at her home rink (Bowie Ice Arena in Bowie, Md.), where Christon Brinton is her coach.

"I enjoy figure skating because I get to learn new skills and spend time with my friends," she said.

Aside from skating and Girl Scouts, Lena also participates in her church's choir and is in her school's garden club, Green Team, orchestra (plays the cello) and chorus. A straight-A student, she has also achieved honor roll every quarter.





competitors' corner

CALM YOUR NERVES - NOT YOUR

Every ice skater who participates in ISI competitions knows that they are fun. There are events for everyone. Skaters who like to do footwork can do an entire event of that. Those who enjoy theatrical performing can do a Solo or Couple Spotlight, Ensemble or Production programs. There are also Rhythmic events, Interpretive events, technical events and non-technical events. There is simply something for everyone — and that is fun!

Citement

However, just because ISI is fun doesn't mean that it isn't competitive. Let's face it, you aren't going to travel across the United States to skate in an ISI national event and not feel some anxiety about wanting to perform and compete at your best. After all, a program is a program.

If, for example, you are skating an Open Freestyle program, you might just be doing that same program again a few weeks later at one of your local club events. Should you approach this differently? Isn't this just a great opportunity to get out in front of judges and an audience? Remember, performing at your best is actually a learned skill and as with any skill, this takes practice. Miyamoto Musashi, an ancient martial arts philosopher and strategist, once said, "You can only fight the way you practice." Taking every opportunity to skate under pressure will only make you a more skilled competitor.

TAILOR YOUR MINDSET

There are other ways to enhance your ability to perform your best. This involves tailoring your mindset to be as positive as possible. It is nearly impossible to skate well if you are constantly criticizing yourself mentally.

Don't tell yourself, "I have to win." Say, "I'm going to do my best, and I'm going to have fun." Don't think about past mistakes. Many top performers — athletes, musicians, actors — follow a routine before they perform. They may dress in a specific order, eat the same foods, always wear a lucky item, or practice in a specific sequence. This relaxes them because they can go through their pre-performance routine without thinking about it.

Recognize your strengths, celebrate your successes and "let go" of any errors when they occur. If you aren't feeling overly confident, pretend that you are. Take on a whole character and play the part by imagining yourself as the best skater on the warm-up. This is one time in your life that you get to pretend to be a different you. No one even has to know. Smile confidently and feel the nerves slip away.

UNDERSTAND YOUR BODY

Understanding your body will also help you. Skaters often say, "I feel nervous," when, in fact, they really mean, "I feel adrenaline coursing through my body." This hormone, which is produced during "stressful" situations, can actually help you skate faster, stronger and with more confidence — if you recognize that the side effects can be butterflies in the stomach and that annoying need to visit the bathroom just before you take the ice. Nervousness comes from being poorly prepared. Assuming you have done the work, practiced your programs diligently and trained as your coach has asked, this is not nervousness — this is *excitement!*

VISUALIZE SUCCESS

Using mental imagery is another smart way to keep your anxiety at bay. Remember to arrive at the rink with plenty of time before your events to do your warm-up. Then, be sure to take some quiet time alone (with or without your music) to picture the program you are about to skate. Be bold and imagine yourself absolutely perfect — every step, every move: flawless. In the famous words of Walt Disney: "If you can dream it, you can achieve it."

BREATHE DEEPLY

As the time for performance draws near, take note of how you are feeling. If you feel confused, lightheaded or listless, breathe deeply and shake the stress out of your body. Shake your hands and fingers, move your head from side to side and around in circles. Jump up and down as a last way of warming yourself up and releasing any stress.

Now you are ready to perform!

There is no question that hard work and dedication are essential attributes of a successful competitor. But by keeping the philosophy of having fun and loving what you do in your mind when you go to competition, you will most certainly give yourself the best chance of finding your inner performer. ISI events are the perfect place to practice that philosophy!

DANCE TO IS IN THE BOOKS
FOR Jessica Buchko!

Jessica Buchko, 28, has been ice dancing on and off for a long time, with a goal of eventually passing the ISI Dance 10 test. When she saw the end in sight, she decided to give it a full-time effort — and now she can add the prestigious Dance 10 level to her list of skating accomplishments.

A registered dietician and skating coach at the Ice Chalet in Knoxville, Tenn., which is also her home rink, Jessica said that passing the test

gives her the experience to be a better teacher and mentor to those skaters who also have the goal of achieving Dance 10, too.

She is also an ISI Freestyle 9 level skater and a U.S. Figure Skating gold medalist in Freeskate, Skating Skills, Partnered Dance and Solo Dance. Larry Laborde, owner and manager of Chalet Ice Rinks, Inc., and Peter Sasmore are her coaches.

"I grew up skating in the ISI program, and now I coach skaters under the ISI program," she said. "I like the 'no pressure' and 'just have fun' aspects of ISI versus other competition programs."

While Jessica hasn't participated in any ISI competitions and events in the past few years, she has students

who participate in multiple competitions each year, including the annual ISI-endorsed Robert Unger competition at Ice Chalet.

She doesn't have a current ice skating program or additional goals at the moment. "I just skate because I love it," she said.

What does she enjoy most about ice dancing?

"I like being creative with different music choices and arm movements to make it one's own," she said. "I like tuning in to the rhythms and cadences of each dance and being able to synchronize with another person."

Jessica considers the biggest challenge of ice dancing to be "maintaining proper technique for the edges and turns of a dance while being expressive of the dance." She added that the most difficult part of the ISI Dance 10 test is "having or finding a partner that you are comfortable with, who is also a good ice dancer."

In her free time, Jessica likes to read, crochet, knit and cross-stitch.





Couple Spotlight

When planning the events you want to enter in your next ISI competition, think about adding one more: **Couple Spotlight!**

Do you have a skater friend whom you would enjoy performing with? If so, then Couple Spotlight just may be the event for you!

Couple Spotlight is for two skaters who perform a skating program that is entertaining, emotional or a portrayal of characters. Event groups are divided as they are for Solo Spotlight, into Character, Dramatic and Light Entertainment categories.

It is strongly encouraged to set this program apart from a technical Couple program by presenting the story you want to tell. Know your audience — in this case, that would be the judges. Understand what they are looking for (judging criteria) in your performance.

Your story should be easily recognizable, and your music should match the costumes, the props and the choreography. Don't make the judges "guess" what is going on during your program.

Costumes and props are encouraged to help illustrate the act. If you decide to use a prop in your program, keep in mind that the prop should be used as a way to help you capture the theme of the program. In other words, don't just have a prop on the ice for the sake of having one.

Here are some Couple Spotlight characters that we have seen over the years: Bride and Groom, Mickey and Minnie Mouse, Beauty and the Beast, Me and My Shadow, Woody and Jessie (or Buzz Lightyear), Santa Claus and Rudolph. These are just examples to help steer you in the right direction to find your own unique program featuring a famous twosome.

If you decide to add this event to your competition repertoire but your skating friend is at a different skating level, that's okay. The only thing to remember is that you must enter into the event at the higher skater's test level. Couple Spotlight events are divided by the following test levels: Low (Tot-Delta), Bronze (FS 1-3), Silver (FS 4-5/Silver), Gold (FS 6-7/Gold) and Platinum (FS 8-10/Platinum).







A 1 full revolution in the air, landing on the backward inside edge of the foot used for takeoff.

B Similar to a half flip but takes off and lands on the same toe used for takeoff.

C A sit spin position with free leg held out to the side.

- E A jump where the skater extends legs into split position in the air (one rotation), landing backward on one foot.
- F 1 1/2 revolutions, takeoff forward inside edge, landing backward outside edge on same foot used for takeoff.
- G An upright glide with the free leg held behind with the knee bent and the foot, knee and thigh held as high as the skating hip.
- H Backwards glide with upper body bent down to touch skating leg while free leg is held straight in air in split position.

- Pinecone (from outdoors or store bought)
- Black acrylic paint
- Black marker
- Craft felt
- Small, white Styrofoam ball Felt (black, white, yellow, orange)
- Paintbrush (small)
- Glue gun

Optional: pipe cleaner (any color) and small craft pom-pom — to make earmuffs.



INSTRUCTIONS:


- **STEP 1.** Prepare the pinecone if found outdoors to exterminate any unwanted pests: Submerge in a solution of water and vinegar (two parts water/one part vinegar) for 30 minutes, freeze in a plastic bag for at least 24 hours or bake in the oven at 200 degrees for 30 minutes.
- **STEP 2.** Once dried, thawed or cooled, paint the pinecone black.




STEP 3. While pinecone is drying, cut out the felt shapes (refer to illustration on the left, below) as follows:



- For the body: 1 white oval shape as shown in illustration (a bit shorter and skinnier than the pinecone)
- 2 black wings and smaller white wings that will be glued on the underside of the black wings
- 1 small orange triangle for the beak
- 2 orange feet
- 1 yellow scarf (8 inches long and 1/2 inches wide; not shown on template) — using scissors, make small cuts into each end to create fringe
- **STEP 4.** Paint the top part of the Styrofoam ball black, coming to a point in the front to make the penguin's head. You can also use a black magic marker if easier.






- Glue the white belly onto the front of the pinecone, just above penguin's feet.
- Glue the white wings onto the black wings and glue to penguin's body.
- Glue the painted Styrofoam ball to the top of the pinecone.

STEP 6. Add Flip's trademark yellow scarf! Wrap it around the head and glue to secure.

STEP 7. Make the penguin's face:

- Using a black marker, make two small dots for eyes.
- Glue the orange felt beak underneath.

OPTIONAL: To make earmuffs, cut a small piece of pipe cleaner long enough to fit around the top of the Styrofoam ball, and glue a small craft pom-pom to each end. Place it on top of the penquin's head.

Q. My daughter's instructor is encouraging her to enter her first competition at our rink. She's only in a Beta class now. What do we have to do to be sure she's ready for this?

A. If your daughter is excited to do this, she is certainly ready! Since she is just now learning the Beta skills, she wouldn't be competing at that level yet. She must first be a current ISI member and pass her Pre-Alpha and Alpha badge test to qualify to compete at that level. Any professional ISI member can administer and register these tests — check with your instructor to determine your rink's policy and procedure. The tests then must be registered in the ISI national office before the competition entry deadline date.

Some competition events require a few private lessons to learn a routine to music, while others don't. Assuming your instructor is an ISI Professional member, she will be knowledgeable on all the different event categories and help your daughter make the best choice for her first competition performance.

Q. My 5-year-old son often watches his sister skate and now says he wants to play hockey, but he's never been on the ice before. What is a good age for him to start?

A. Most hockey coaches will tell you that their best players are those who have solid skating skills. Your son is certainly ready to start mastering the balance and learning forward and backward skating, stopping, crossovers and turning maneuvers that will allow him later to focus on things like stickhandling and scoring goals!

Q. My daughter's foot has been growing quickly and she needs another pair of skates. I want to be sure the next pair lasts for years, but her instructor insists this is a bad idea. What is the problem with getting another pair with plenty of "growing room?"

A. A couple of things — first, stand your daughter's skate on a flat surface like a tabletop. Notice how the entire blade is not touching the surface. Only a small portion of the blade, called the "rocker," actually touches the ice when upright. It is important that the ball of your daughter's foot be over this part of the blade for proper balance. A skate that is too long will cause her weight to shift dangerously backward.

Blisters are also formed from skates that are too big — not too small, as is often believed. The boot needs to be snug enough that the foot and skate move as one. When the foot has room to move around and rub back and forth against the leather, painful blisters will occur.

Therefore, it is never recommended to get more than a half-size in "growing room." Even then, insoles are often used initially to elevate the foot and take up some of the additional space in the boot to prevent injury.
